"A 'bedtime story', told by a famous supporter (last year it was delivered by Dame Helen Mirren), will be shown in the church hall during the evening.


"Hot drinks will be available all night in the hall, where people can come for some heat if being out in the cold gets too much. A hot breakfast roll will be available in the morning."

Social Bite is on a mission to bring Scotland together, to build a collaborative movement to end homelessness here. To do that we need to make houses available to the homeless, we need to fund a support resource for people to sustain their tenancies, and we need to integrate these vulnerable and marginalised people back into society – where they belong.



THE WORLD Day of Prayer is not just about one day in March when a service is held using the hymns, prayers and words of the writing country that help us to identify with the struggles of people around the world who suffer abuse, both physical and mental.

It is also about joining together with Christians every day and every year to show fellowship and faith, and that we do not live in isolation unaware of others struggles.

From June 12-19, 2020, the World Day of Prayer Scottish Committee will host an International Meeting with approximately 188 women from around the world.

As hosts, the Committee has agreed to pay for the conference rooms and various activities to show that Scotland is an active participant in support of women's groups universally such as 'Feed the Minds', HIV, Female Genital Mutilation and local charities of the writing country.

Many countries are unable to send a delegate because of the costs of accommodation and meals, but, because we are funding the meeting it enables the International Committee to support up to 40 women to attend.

The Scottish Committee has joined with www.easyfundraising.org.uk to raise funds and would ask anyone who buys online to sign into this website and look for World Day of Prayer Scotland.

There are more than 4,000 companies who, when buying from them, will make a donation to WDP Scotland. These include insurance companies, travel, Ebay, etc.


