MESSAGE FROM CALUM MARTIN

'General Assembly 2025 and Christian Aid Week'

In the run up to this year's General Assembly, and to Christian Aid Week 2025, I'm writing to share some the details of a few upcoming GA Fringe events being organised by Christian Aid Scotland and some of our Church of Scotland partners. These may be of interest to Presbytery members.

St Giles' Cathedral <u>Special service</u> to mark our 80th anniversary Saturday 17 May, 7pm Our keynote will be delivered by The Right Honourable John Swinney, First Minister of Scotland, and worship will be led by the Wild Goose Resource Group and Siskin Green.

Doors will open from 6.15pm. Guests are warmly welcomed, and no RSVP is required. However, any guests planning to attend in a wheelchair or accompanied by a guide dog, please let us know by emailing <u>edinburgh@christian-aid.org</u> or phoning 0131 220 1254, so that we can reserve adequate space. Please note that as a historic building, the Cathedral does not have wheelchair-accessible toilets.

Lunchtime events (12.30-2pm) at St Columba'sby-the-Castle (EH1 2PW), all including a free lunch:

<u>A Christian presence in the Holy Land</u>: in search of Justice and Peace in the midst of war Monday 19 May

Hear from William Bell, Christian Aid's Middle East Policy and Advocacy Lead and Rev Muriel Pearson, Church of Scotland Mission Partner.

<u>The Power of Hope</u>: marking 80 years of Christian Aid, Tuesday 20 May

Hear from Very Rev Dr Russell Barr, locum at Largo Parish Church and Ms Temwa Kasakula, Faith Share partner and Christian Aid Global Advisor for gender and reproductive health. <u>Repairing the world</u>: The Church, justice and global reparations, Wednesday 21 May Hear from Very Rev Sally Foster Fulton, Christian Aid Scotland's UK and Global Church Ambassador, and Tatianna Ennin, Christian Aid Reparations Programme Advisor.

This year we also mark the 80th anniversary of Christian Aid's founding by the churches in Britain and Ireland. There are special events and celebrations taking shape throughout the year, including services in <u>Largo</u> 11 May and <u>Inverurie</u> 13 May. These two towns share links with the Rev Douglas Lister, the Church of Scotland minister who first approached the churches about supporting European refugees after World War Two.

As we approach <u>Christian Aid Week 2025</u>, we'll be sharing stories from our work in Guatemala, where our partners are working with Indigenous communities to push back against the climate crisis with agricultural training and land rights education.

We've been in contact directly with many Christian Aid Church Representatives and supporting congregations within the Presbytery itself, but to just to share the offer too, that if there is any support we can give at a Presbytery or committee level, we'd be delighted to help.

Whether that might be hosting an 80th anniversary service or exhibition in the Presbytery, planting <u>Trees of Hope</u>, or whether we can help provide speakers or services for congregations do let us know.

As churches across the Presbytery shape and arrange Christian Aid Week and 80th events we'll also be sharing as many of them as possible on <u>our Scotland events page</u>.

VE DAY - 80th Anniversary


VE DAY SERVICES AND EVENTS AROUND PRESBYTERY

Bindal News - Mr Douglas Gordon

After all the spring barley has been sown, then there is the waiting time to see when the first leaves come through the ground. It determined greatly on the temperature of the soil. Depending on the crop the temperature of the soil needs to be at least 5°C, 8-12°C is optimal. Unfortunately, some years it might not grow in a waterlogged area etc. It amazes me (and it is a relief) to see the new leaves come through the ground. It doesn' take long to have a crop that is a green carpet of leaves covering the field! However, we still need rain and sunshine to keep the crop growing.

Then you can see the tramlines where the sprayer will go up and down the field every 28 metres, to keep the crop clean from disease and add nutrients when needed. When the weather is dry, we can add foliar feeds to keep the crop growing, as the roots will not take up moisture or nutrients in the soil if the ground is so dry. It's lovely to get a dew in dry weather to add moisture to the leaves so it can soak in the moisture.

When we read the parable of the sower in the Bible. Matthew 13 v 8. The seed sown on good ground where it produced far more than the single seed sown that was sown. It reminds me of crops we sow with the best seed, we fertilise it, so it produces the maximum yield & quality according to the weather conditions. It is the same with us, after we are born, as we grow up and learn to do things with our hands, feet and develop our brains. We want what is best for ourselves.

You develop your memory by what you see and read. What we are taught by our parents and teachers. God wants us to read the Bible and speak (pray) to him. We must look to Jesus and ask him to come into our lives & save us from our sins by saying we are sorry for our sins. He wants us to follow him, so he can teach us through the bible how we should live. What is best for us. The 10 commandments give us rules to follow in Exodus 20.

He wants us to tell others about Jesus, so his church will grow. I wonder how many people in churches who just sit in their pew and think I am alright, and just let the preacher do all the praying, but we need to pray to God as well and ask him to help our church to grow and more people come to know Jesus. The more people who pray the better. Pray every day. John 4 v 35-36 "Don't you have a saying, "It's still four months until harvest"? I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest. 36 Even now the one who reaps draws a wage and harvests a crop for eternal life, so that the sower and the reaper may be glad together." For every sinner saved there is rejoicing in heaven. Are you praying for others to be saved?

The Bible talks about straight & narrow in Matthew 7 v 13-14 13 "Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. 14 But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it". The tramlines remind me of these verses in the Bible being straight & narrow. In a wet year if you have a wet hole and slide off the tramline and make a mess, you have a mess all the way to harvest.


